Interpreters' Coalition

Children acquire fundamental concepts through active participation with their environment. As young children explore their surroundings, they begin to construct their own knowledge (Lind, 1998).

While the school classroom remains the primary instructional center, out-of-classroom experiences can bring a sense of wonderment and curiosity about the world to young learners. The Springfield area is rich with community resources that can provide educational experiences for students that might not otherwise be available to them.

In a truly collaborative effort, the Interpreters' Coalition utilizes the varied resources of our community toward field education and hands-on learning experiences. The Coalition was formed to help meet the educational needs of students and currently consists of partner members ranging from non-profit organizations to governmental agencies. This group of informal educators represents cross-curricular interests and expertise including science and the environment, history and social studies, communication and technology, and the arts. The Coalition sponsors an annual field trip for teachers, known as "Free-Wheelin' Friday". This event gives local educators an opportunity to find out about the various educational resources available throughout the city of Springfield.

The Air and Military Museum of the Ozarks AMMO

Mission: To collect historical memorabilia and artifacts from all branches of the military, to restore, preserve, and display them for remembrance, and to educate the public and provide a “hands on” environment to demonstrate military equipment that was used in the wars fought to preserve America’s freedoms.

Programs: The Air and Military Museum of the Ozarks offers to all grade school students and scouting organizations a program of military history and science that teaches and entertains young students about the history of wars fought to preserve our freedoms. We call it “Museum School.” There is always an experienced volunteer on duty to answer your military questions.

Age/Grade Level: We welcome groups of any age.

Group Size: The museum can accommodate groups of 50 people.

Student/Adult Ratio: The scheduling organization should provide one adult per ten children.

Programs: Extension specialists in southwest Missouri are available to present programs on topics related to agricultural profitability and viability; human development and individual strengths; business, community and economic development; enhancing health and nutrition; environmental quality and stewardship and youth development. Specific programs include:

Horticulture: The horticulture program provides educational opportunities for home horticulture and commercial horticulture interests in the SW region.

Master Gardening: The Master Gardener program provides in-depth horticultural training to individuals who then volunteer their time applying what they have learned to help others in their community to learn about gardening and environmental education.

4-H: 4-H is a volunteer-led organization that reaches youth ages 8-18. 4-H members decide for themselves which of more than 50 projects they want to learn more about. Projects use hands-on learning experiences to teach subject matter and life-skills such as cooperation, problem solving, and decision making. A pre-4-H program called Clover Kids is offered for children 5-7 years of age.

Age/Grade Level: programs are available for people of all ages.

Group Size: Programs are available on an individual basis and for groups of all sizes

Student/Adult Ratio: specific to individual programs.

Fees: specific to individual programs.

Notes: other services at the Greene County MU Extension office include soil testing, plant insect and disease diagnosis, the Master Gardener hotline for assistance with gardening questions, and publications on a wide range of topics.

Watershed Committee of the Ozarks

Mission: "The mission of the Watershed Committee of the Ozarks (WCO) is to preserve and improve the water supplies of Springfield and Greene County through education and effective management of the region's watersheds." The Watershed Center is the educational focus of the WCO. We offer free field trips, tours, and educational assistance to students and teachers in the interest of clean water. Types of activities may include, but are not limited to, outdoor field trips at Valley Water Mill, "green" building demonstrations, Jordan Creek Underground tours, Stream Trailer demonstrations, and Stream Team activities.

Availability: Most Watershed Center tours and activities can be specifically tailored to the interested parties. Watershed Committee personnel appreciate notification several weeks in advance of an intended activity. In many instances, tours and activities are conducted in partnership with other area organizations and agencies, so adequate advance notice is necessary.

Programs: Watershed programs cover watershed science, water quality, drinking water source protection and citizen involvement in protecting rivers, streams and lakes.

Group Size: Watershed programs are best suited to groups of about fifty people or less

Student/Adult Ratio: Prefer at least one adult per ten children

Fees: There is no charge for Watershed Committee tours or activities.

Lunch Provisions: Typically not provided, unless special prior arrangements have been made. Fast food options are available nearby.

Wildcat Glades Conservation and Audubon Center

Mission: The Audubon Nature Center opened in the fall of 2007. Programs are currently offered as requested and focus on the interpretation and management of the last remaining 60 acres of globally unique chert glade habitat and the Shoal Creek natural resource.

Age/grade level: Programs are available for all ages and grade levels.

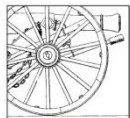
Group Size: Maximum 60, which will often be divided into smaller groups. Groups will stay with their classroom for field programs and trail hikes.

Wilson's Creek National Battlefield



WILSON'S CREEK
National Battlefield
150th Anniversary

Mission: The purpose of Wilson's Creek National Battlefield is to commemorate the Battle of Wilson's Creek and to preserve the associated battlefield.

Location: 6424 W. Farm Road 182, Republic. The site is located ten miles southwest of Springfield, between the cities of Battlefield and Republic.

The battlefield Visitor Center is open seven days a week, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The Museum is open seven days a week, 9am to 5pm (closed 12 p.m. to 1 p.m. for lunch.) During December, January, February and March, the museum is closed for maintenance and traditionally low visitation. Hours for the battlefield Tour Road may be extended during the spring, summer and fall.

Availability: Curriculum based educational programs are available Monday through Friday during the months of April and May depending upon volunteer and staff availability. Groups are encouraged to schedule field trips to Wilson's Creek as soon as possible after October 1. General public programs and special events are offered on weekends throughout the year.

Programs: Educational programs offered include a 30 minute orientation DVD, an eight minute fiber-optics terrain map presentation; talk/tour of the Ray House, a farmhouse used as a field hospital during the battle; a Civil War medical talk and a common soldier program and musket firing demonstration. K – 12 Curriculum guides are available in a downloadable format on the battlefield's website: www.nps.gov/wicr. Traveling trunks are also available for classroom use at no charge. Groups will also be given time to tour the Visitor Center exhibit area and bookstore on their own. Age/grade level: Programs are available for 4th-12th grade.

Group Size: Up to five buses may be accommodated on one day

Student/Adult Ratio: One adult chaperone per ten children is recommended; more are encouraged, especially with younger groups.

Fees: A fee waiver for educational groups should be requested in writing prior to the scheduled visit. Funding is not available to help with transportation costs. Bus parking is provided. The Fee Waiver Request form is available on-line at www.nps.gov/wicr or by contacting the park outreach coordinator at (417) 732 – 2662 ext. 385.

Lunch Provisions: Food is not allowed in the Visitor Center. A picnic area with a covered pavilion located near the Visitor Center is available for sack lunches. Beverage vending machines are located near the picnic area.

About WOLF: Wonders of the Ozarks Learning Facility (WOLF) is a school of choice created by Springfield Public Schools for 5th graders with a special interest in nature and the outdoors. The school was developed in collaboration with Wonders of Wildlife Museum and Bass Pro.

Students will attend WOLF each day school is in session. Their physical classroom will be at the Wonders of Wildlife Educational Center, 726 W. Sunshine.
